HELPING YOUNG FAMILIES THRIVE

Raising a family is possibly one of the hardest jobs in the world. But for young parents from communities in need, it's much harder. Many experience social isolation, discrimination, poor health outcomes and unstable housing.

Organisations such as YFS in Logan know young parents have great potential to create meaningful lives for themselves and their children.

Tailored support is what's needed and that's exactly what YFS will provide with the support of Hand Heart Pocket the Charity of Freemasons Queensland.

Over the next two years, 150 young people and 750 young families will be supported to thrive, thanks to \$900,000 in philanthropic funding from the Freemasons' charity.

The new partnership will directly contribute to building the capacity of these young parents, enabling them to successfully navigate the challenges they face.

YFS CEO Cath Bartolo said the funding would allow YFS to trial new ways to improve the outcomes for vulnerable young parents.

"Over the past two years, YFS has trialled the integration of a housing worker with our families teams, with amazing outcomes for families despite a dire housing market," she said.

"We learned a lot about how to integrate services so people can sustain change in their lives.

"Now we hope to expand our services to address the common barriers young



families face; things like domestic violence, isolation, trauma and unemployment."

Young dad Dean is one of the first parents to experience the new approach.

Dean was homeless when he first connected with YFS. Quick work by the YFS young parents team ensured he had a safe place to stay with his children and was able to navigate complex family issues.

Dean was part of Young Dads' Squad, an initiative to support young fathers and teach them about children's development.

Dean said, "I learned new skills, and learned about coping with children and how to read children's behaviour. I've met other young dads and you talk about different things. And you're not being judged."

Now Dean is becoming a mentor for other young dads. Dean said he got a lot out of Young Dads' Squad, and he wants to pass that on.

"You can meet other young dads, talk about dad stuff, and help support dads who might have a few issues going on, and just be there for each other."

Our philanthropy

Last financial year, Hand Heart Pocket provided \$3.14 million in philanthropic support a majority of which funded programs to support our most at-risk young people to thrive.

Helping Lodges to engage with their communities has continued to be a focus of ours, having provided over \$200,000 to support local initiatives last financial year. Many were COVID-emergency grants identified by Lodges.

Youth and Family Services

Youth and Family Services (YFS) in Logan is our latest Significant Grant recipient.

The grant will help to break the cycle of intergenerational disadvantage in Logan and help young families to lead more independent lives, as active members of their community.

River 2 Reef Charity Ride

The Hand Heart Pocket River 2 Reef Charity Ride will take place in Mackay next month. Anyone in the area is encouraged to register for this family friendly, COVID-safe event on 11 September.

As the Naming Rights Sponsor for the last three years, we've provided \$25,000 p.a. towards the event and have also matched the first \$50,000 raised by participants.

Three local charities will benefit from the event including, Real Mates

Talk, RACQ CQ Rescue and Sporting Wheelies & Disabled Association Mackay.


What excites you the most about Hand Heart Pocket's future?

Hand Heart Pocket has a wide network across the state and can assist Lodges to identify like minded organisations that would appreciate support from Freemasons either through volunteering or donations.



MEET THE DIRECTORS: LISA SIGANTO



Can you tell us about your background, qualifications and experience?

Right from the start I was grounded in social justice. I surprised everyone when I did Civil Engineering, but it made sense as I love solving problems.

The day I graduated from the University of Queensland I won a scholarship to work in London as a project manager which took me there for 4 years and then I found myself at Harvard doing an MBA. It was 20 years ago, when I was having my fourth child, that I really felt conflicted

about my work and my heart wasn't in corporate life. I wanted to work with business to solve social problems and that's really what I've been doing ever since

What attracted you to the role of director with Hand Heart Pocket?

Philanthropy plays such an important role in our society and impact investing is a growing sector, both of which help people in need through partnerships for change.

Hand Heart Pocket has the opportunity and responsibility to manage its assets well and focus on the best possible investments, outcomes and impact in Queensland. This is a privileged position I'm delighted to take on. It fits in well with my own experience in impact investing, social enterprises and board positions.

I'm also currently a Director for Indigenous organisation Cape York Partnership. Having been on boards for nearly 30 years, there has been much learning along the way. I now choose carefully where I spend my time. My criteria is that the Board and organisation need to have purpose,

have integrity, be in a position to be achieving significant impact and they have to have great people around the board table. Hand Heart Pocket meets that criteria.

What excites you the most about Hand Heart Pocket's future?

There is a great executive team at the helm with the new CEO Sara Parrott who I believe will deliver a great future. There is a detailed plan in place with clear direction, actions and KPIs. The Board is enthusiastic, competent, engaged and warm.
